





Americans' Opinions on Abortion Restrictions Over Time











Do you strongly support, support, oppose, or strongly oppose using tax dollars to support abortion services in other countries?








Do you think for someone to receive these prescription medications: An in-person visit with a healthcare professional should be required or an in-person visit with a healthcare professional should not be required?






Pregnancy Resource Centers












- This survey of 1,387 adults was conducted January 7th through January 9th, 2025 by the Marist Poll sponsored in partnership with the Knights of Columbus.
- Survey questions were available in English or Spanish. Phone and online samples were selected to ensure that each region was represented in proportion to its adult population. The samples were then combined and balanced to reflect the 2022 American Community Survey 5-year estimates for age, gender, income, race, and region.
- Results are statistically significant within ±3.2 percentage points. There are 1,221 registered voters. The results for this subset are statistically significant within ±3.5 percentage points.
- Tables include results for subgroups to only display crosstabs with an acceptable sampling error. It should be noted that although you may not see results listed for a certain group, it does not mean interviews were not completed with those individuals. It simply means the sample size is too small to report.
- The error margin was adjusted for sample weights and increases for crosstabulations.
